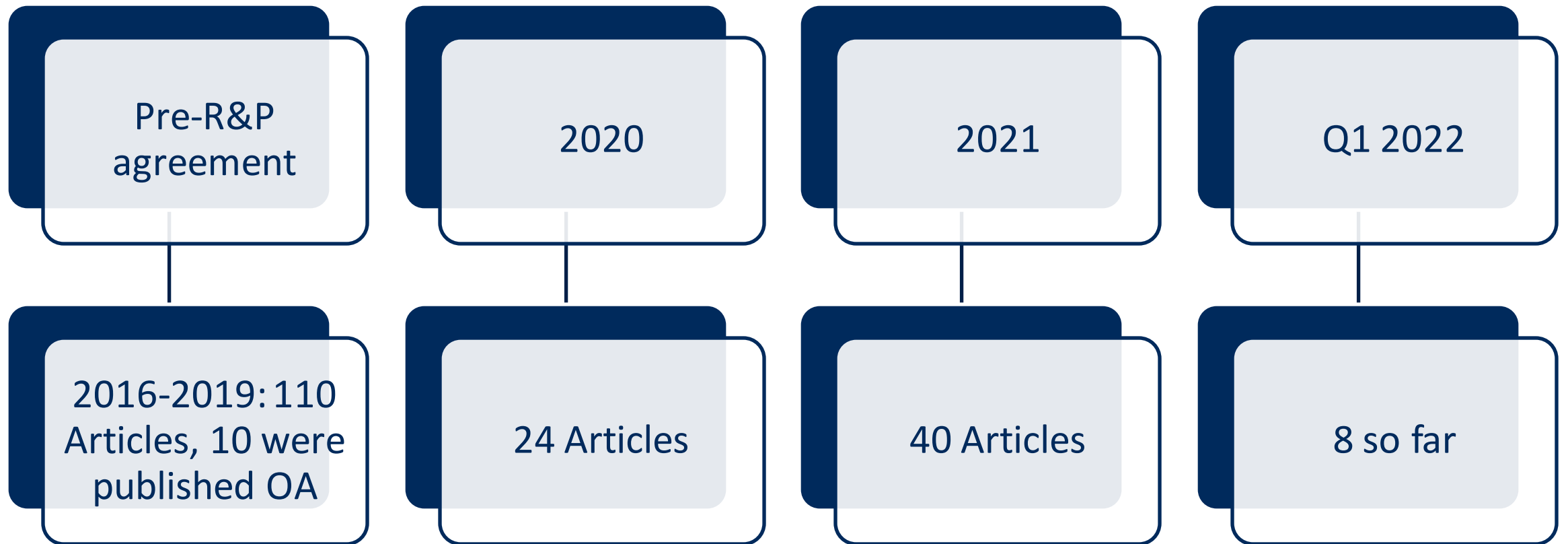

Sophistication of website has improved, clearer information presented about deal



Submissions workflow for researchers has become more seamless re: eligibility and cost



Further influence of Plan S: some Karger journals have become "transformative journals"



CC-BY-ND no longer an option

Learning Lessons



New but foreseeable issues in the management of these deals

Eligibility and institutional boundaries
Communications campaigns with Deans and researchers
Karger and other publishers seem to realize this is a source of time expenditure for us
